

RESOLUTION

DIRECTING THE APPROPRIATE SENATE COMMITTEE TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, ON THE REPORTED INCREASE IN ONLINE SEXUAL EXPLOITATION OF CHILDREN IN THE COUNTRY DURING THE COVID-19 ENHANCED COMMUNITY QUARANTINE

WHEREAS, according to the Department of Justice Office of Cybercrime (OOC), the reports of online sexual exploitation of children increased by 264 percent as the country is battling the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic¹;

WHEREAS, according to the OOC, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, a private and non-profit corporation in the United States whose mission is to reduce child exploitation and help find missing children, recorded a total of 279,166 cases from its Cyberline Trip Report hotline from March 01, 2020 to May 24, 2020 compared to 76,561 reports during the same period in 2019²;

WHEREAS, OOC stated that the increase was attributable to the enhanced community quarantine (ECQ), strict home quarantine observed in all households, and internet usage surges as people stay home³;

WHEREAS, parts of the country were placed under ECQ on March 16, 2020 due to the rise of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, the ECQ posed a barrier to detection because children have almost no access to teachers or community members to whom they may disclose abuse or display signs of abuse;

WHEREAS, based on a study released by the Washington-based International Justice Mission (IJM), the Philippines has emerged as a global hot spot for online child sexual exploitation⁴;

WHEREAS, the spread of cheap, high-speed internet and the rise in mobile phone ownership had fueled live streamed abuse⁵;

WHEREAS, according to IJM, online child sex abuse is largely a family-based crime meaning home is the place of vulnerability and exploitation, rather than a place of safety. IJM further stated that since 2011, more than half of those arrested for online child sex abuse were parents, relatives or family friends⁶;

WHEREAS, a Philippine court has just sentenced a U.S. citizen who is based in the country, David Deakin (Deakin), to life imprisonment for three counts of human trafficking. Deakin had recorded child sex abuse and sold it to foreign customers online⁷;

WHEREAS, the UNICEF estimates 1.8 million children are being trafficked every year but this does not include victims of cybersex trafficking⁸;

WHEREAS, it is necessary for the Senate to look into this matter to protect Filipino children from all forms of violence, exploitation, abuse and neglect;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Senate directs the appropriate Senate committee to conduct an inquiry, in aid of legislation, on the reported increase in online sexual exploitation of children in the country during the COVID-19 enhanced community quarantine.
