AN ACT

FURTHERING LOCAL LEADERSHIP AND ACCOUNTABILITY IN BASIC EDUCATION GOVERNANCE TO ACHIEVE QUALITY INCLUSIVE EDUCATION THROUGH THE 21ST CENTURY SCHOOL BOARDS AND SCHOOL GOVERNING COUNCILS, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This legislation embodies my vision of a village raising every child – as it strengthens the involvement of every member of the local community in basic education governance by empowering its members to participate in the journey of a child's education. I am envisioning the 21st Century School Board to be the distinctive hallmark of Philippine basic education to disrupt the ways we educate our children by mandating education to be a shared responsibility and accountability.

Education must be everybody's business – it should have always been. However, it is not only collaboration that is critical in making education a successful community-based endeavor. It is the culture of collective

accountability in the delivery of quality education services, and its outcomes, that this bill seeks to achieve and which will turn this vision into reality.

The Department of Education is in charge of the central management of the public education system in the country. It is mandated under Republic Act No. 9155, otherwise known as the Governance of Basic Education Act of 2001, to formulate, implement, and coordinate policies, plans, programs and projects in the areas of formal and non-formal basic education. It supervises all elementary and secondary education institutions, including alternative learning systems, both public and private, and provides for the establishment and maintenance of a complete, adequate, and integrated system of basic education relevant to the goals of national development.

This proposition on education governance reform, inspired by the advocacy of the late statesman and leader Jesse M. Robredo, and formulated from the trailblazing work of the Synergeia Foundation, seeks to reinvent the local school board "to bring about large-scale systemic reforms in a centrally managed public education system." Under this bill, the existing local school boards are empowered beyond their traditional function? for more than 30 years under Republic Act No. 7160 or the Local Government Code of 1991 of allocating the Special Education Fund (SEF) for the supplementary budgetary support to local public schools, through the following policy innovations:

First, it expands the eight-member board to involve other relevant actors in the community and stakeholders of education whose participation is critical to decision-making on issues such as the state and quality of public education within its local jurisdiction and the participation of parents in the education of their children. The current

membership does not enable local communities to participate meaningfully in education governance.

Second, the following extensive functions of the school board have been purposively added to create the multiplier effect and revolutionary change in education governance: (1) establish a vision for quality inclusive education within the locality; (2) formulate policies, institute education reforms and programs, allocate resources, and introduce interventions based on empirical results that emphasize and focus on quality; (3) communicate at the barangay and school levels such vision, policies, reforms, programs and interventions to facilitate collaborative action and develop partnerships with community stakeholders; (4) conduct education summits at least once a year to report to the community the progress in the implementation of its education reforms, programs and interventions, and consult community members on issues in basic education to further guide its prioritization in the allocation of the special education fund; (5) introduce timely, organized, and localized interventions in the delivery of basic education services during times of calamities, disasters, and emergencies; and (6) coordinate the implementation of the alternative learning system program.

Third, to support the expanded functions of the school boards, the utilization of the SEF has also been broadened to include the following: salaries or wages of SEF-paid teachers and non-teaching personnel assigned to public elementary and secondary schools; construction, repair, and maintenance of public elementary and secondary school buildings, equipment, and other facilities; acquisition or procurement of books and instructional or learning materials; educational research; educational summits, community townhall meetings, discussions, and consultations on education; community mapping of data related to education; operation and maintenance of ALS programs within its local jurisdiction; and formulation and implementation of locally oriented non-

formal and distance education classes and training programs, among others.

Fourth, it seeks to establish and maintain a School Governing Council in every public and private basic educational institution to ensure a continuous, efficient and effective basic education service and develop collaborative partnership among the stakeholders in the education community.

Finally, the budget process is mandated to be executed in a participatory and transparent manner, and must ensure that the budgetary allocations are based on need and anchored on the school board's vision and goals. Two new sections are further introduced: the institutionalization of greater transparency in the school board's operations and its utilization of the SEF, and the development of a manual to guide the allocation and utilization of the SEF and the efficient functioning of the school board.

It is my fervent hope that my colleagues support this dream legislation and recognize its urgency and value in realizing our one aspiration as a nation to make Filipinos as among the best-educated in the world. I have seen our country's several attempts in the past to provide various antidotes to our decades-old issues in education, yet we have not given our local leaders and communities – the so-called village – the space to meaningfully participate in and be accountable for our children's future. This legislation gives them that chance, and challenge, to make it happen in the 21st Century.



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Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

Section 1. Short Title. - This Act shall be known as the "21st Century 1 School Boards Act". 2 3 Sec. 2. Section 98 of Republic Act (RA) No. 7160, otherwise known as 4 the "Local Government Code of 1991", as amended, is hereby further 5 amended to read as follows: 6 "Sec. 98. Creation, Composition, and Compensation. -7 (a) There shall be established in every province, city, or 8 municipality a provincial, city, or municipal school board, respectively. 10 (b) The composition of local school boards shall be as follows: 11

THE EDUCATION PROGRAM SUPERVISOR FOR ALS OF THE SCHOOLS DIVISION OFFICE, AND THREE (3) REPRESENTATIVES WHO SHALL BE DETERMINED JOINTLY BY THE GOVERNOR AND THE SCHOOLS DIVISION SUPERINTENDENT FROM ANY OF THE FOLLOWING GROUPS: ACCREDITED NONGOVERNMENTAL OR CIVIL SOCIETY ORGANIZATIONS, RELIGIOUS LEADERS, PRIVATE INDUSTRY OR BUSINESS, YOUTH, MEDIA, MILITARY, POLICE, AND INDIGENOUS PEOPLES, as members, WITH THE PROVINCIAL BUDGET OFFICER AND THE PROVINCIAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT OFFICER AS RESOURCE PERSONS:

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(2) The city school board shall be composed of the city mayor and the city superintendent of schools as co-chairmen; the chairman of the education committee of the sangguniang panlungsod, the city treasurer, the representative of the "pederasyon ng mga sangguniang kabataan" in the sangguniang panlungsod, the duly elected president of the city federation of parents-teachers associations, the duly elected representative of the teachers' organizations in the city, [and] the duly elected representative of the non-academic personnel

 - (C) COMMUNICATE AT THE BARANGAY AND SCHOOL LEVELS SUCH VISION, POLICIES, REFORMS, PROGRAMS AND INTERVENTIONS TO FACILITATE COLLABORATIVE ACTION AND DEVELOP PARTNERSHIPS WITH THE COMMUNITY STAKEHOLDERS IN ORDER TO MAKE THE DELIVERY OF BASIC EDUCATION SERVICES AND THE HOLISTIC EDUCATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF SCHOOL CHILDREN A SHARED RESPONSIBILITY;

PROGRAMS AND INTERVENTIONS, AND CONSULT COMMUNITY MEMBERS ON ISSUES IN BASIC EDUCATION TO FURTHER GUIDE ITS PRIORITIZATION IN THE ALLOCATION OF THE SPECIAL EDUCATION FUND:

- (E) INTRODUCE TIMELY, ORGANIZED AND LOCALIZED INTERVENTIONS IN THE DELIVERY OF BASIC EDUCATION SERVICES DURING TIMES OF CALAMITIES, DISASTERS, EMERGENCIES, CATASTROPHES, AND OTHER SIMILAR CAUSES, THAT MAY DISRUPT THE REGULAR SCHOOL CALENDAR AND ACTIVITIES;
- (F) STRATEGICALLY ALLOCATE THE SPECIAL EDUCATION FUND AND OTHER SOURCES OF REVENUE AS THIS CODE AND OTHER LAWS OR ORDINANCES MAY PROVIDE IN A PARTICIPATORY AND TRANSPARENT MANNER AS PRESCRIBED UNDER SECTION 100 (B) OF THIS CODE, AND ENSURE THAT THE BUDGETARY ALLOCATIONS ARE BASED ON NEED AND ANCHORED ON ITS VISION AND GOALS;
- (G) (b) Authorize the provincial, city or municipal treasurer, as the case may be, to disburse funds from the Special Education Fund pursuant to the budget prepared and in accordance with existing rules and regulations;

 - Sec. 8. The School Governing Council. To ensure collaborative partnership among the educational community stakeholders, every public and private basic educational institution shall establish and maintain a School Governing Council (SGC) to ensure a continuous, efficient and effective basic education service towards the improvement of learning and promotion

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- of the welfare of the learners. It shall be guided by the principles of shared
- 2 leadership, commitment and accountability.
- 3 Giving due consideration to geographical location and student
- 4 demographics, the SGC shall be composed of such members from the private
- 5 and public stakeholders as follows:

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- 6 (A) The school head as the Chief Executive Officer;
- 7 (B) One (1) representative from the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) to be elected by the members of the PTA;
- 9 (C) One (1) teacher representative to be elected by the teaching and nonteaching staff of the school;
 - (D) One (1) representative from the alumni association;
- 12 (E) The barangay captain or the Chair of the Education Committee of the barangay;
 - (F) The president or head of the Student Council Organization; if there is no such organization in the school, one (1) student representative to be elected by the student population;
 - (G)One (1) representative from a nongovernmental organization operating in the community, to be selected by the other members of the SGC; and
- 20 (H) Such other necessary members as the local school board may determine.
- The members of the SGC shall elect among themselves the Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer and Auditor of the SGC.
- To achieve its mandate, the SGC shall have the following powers and functions:
- 26 (A) Determine the general policies of the school on student welfare, 27 discipline and well-being;
 - (B) Participate in the development of the School Improvement Plan (SIP);
 - (C) Adopt a Constitution and By-laws to guide its decisions;
- 30 (D) Conduct its affairs in keeping with the school's decision-making processes;

- 1 (E) Assist in the planning and setting direction for the school;
- 2 (F) Organize committees to support the school head and staff in the implementation of the SIP;
 - (G) Regularly conduct consultation as an avenue for multi-level and multi-stakeholder assessment of the school's state of education;
 - (H) Monitor and evaluate the implementation of the SIP, and develop such monitoring and evaluation tools;
 - (I) Report the progress of SIP Implementation to the Schools Division Superintendent and the community;
 - (J) Generate resources to support the implementation of the SIP;
 - (K) Manage its resources; and

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- (L) Such other powers and functions as may be necessary for its effective performance.
 - The school head as Chief Executive Officer shall:
 - (A) Implement the SIP which includes delegating responsibilities to other staff and setting up processes to monitor progress, collecting and analyzing data, and documenting relevant information;
 - (B) Implement policies developed in partnership with the SGC;
 - (C) Provide accurate and timely information to include progress reports about the SIP, government requirements and initiatives, and financial reports on school expenditure; and
- (D) Perform such other functions as the SGC may deem necessary.
- For purposes of this section, the Department of Education shall adopt existing guidelines on the SGC or promulgate such implementing guidelines for its governance.
- Sec. 9. Implementing Rules and Regulations. Within sixty (60) days after the effectivity of this Act, the Department of the Interior and Local Government, Department of Education, Commission on Higher Education, Technical Education and Skills Development Authority, Department of Social

- 1 Welfare and Development, Philippine Statistics Authority, Union of Local
- 2 Authorities of the Philippines, National Economic and Development Authority,
- 3 Department of Finance, Department of Budget and Management, and other
- 4 education stakeholders, shall promulgate the rules and regulations for its
- 5 effective implementation. The Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR)
- 6 issued pursuant to this section shall take effect thirty (30) days after its
- 7 publication in a newspaper of general circulation.

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Sec. 10. *Transitory Provision*. – All existing local school boards established pursuant to the provisions of RA No. 7160, as amended, shall continue to operate pursuant to, and shall be covered by, the provisions of this Act and its IRR.

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Sec. 11. Separability Clause. – If any provision or part of this Act is declared invalid or unconstitutional, the remaining provisions or parts not affected shall remain in full force and effect.

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Sec. 12. Repealing Clause. – All laws, executive orders, presidential decrees, administrative orders, rules and regulations, issuances, or parts thereof inconsistent with or contrary to the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed or amended accordingly.

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Sec. 13. *Effectivity*. – Notwithstanding the non-issuance of the IRR, this Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in the Official Gazette or in a newspaper of general circulation.
