## AN ACT CREATING ANTI-DRUG ABUSE COUNCIL IN ALL PROVINCES, CITIES, MUNICIPALITIES, AND BARANGAYS THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY AND PROVIDING FUNDS THEREFOR

## **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

According to the Local Government Code, the local government units are mandated to ensure and support the health and safety of the general public and preserve the peace and order of their constituents. The proposed measure seeks to establish an Anti-Drug Abuse Council in each Province, City ,Municipality and Barangay to effectively implement an anti-drug abuse program beginning at the grassroots level. The proposed bill also seeks to source the program by mandating the concerned local government units to allocate at least two percent (2%) of their annual budget to fund the creation and operation of this proposed measure.

In view of the foregoing, the immediate approval of this bill is earnestly sought.

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Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

- Section 1. Declaration of Policy. Section 15, Article II of the 1987 Constitution
- 2 mandates the State to "protect and promote the right to health of the people and instill
- 3 health consciousness among them." In order to fulfill this mandate, there is a need to
- 4 create mechanisms where a health-based approach on drug addiction can be
- 5 implemented in the grassroots level. In line with this, it is hereby declared the policy of
- 6 the State to establish Anti-Drug Abuse Councils in all provinces, cities, municipalities, and
- 7 barangays all over the country as the main implementation organs for prevention,
- 8 rehabilitation, and monitoring drug dependency cases.

10 Sec. 2. Definition of Terms –

- a. ADAC Anti Drug Abuse Council refers to a multi-sector council composed of local 1
- officials and representatives of various community organizations tasked to spearhead 2
- the planning and implementation, and monitoring of all local anti-drug abuse programs, 3
- projects and activities. All local government units provinces, cities, municipalities, and 4
- barangays are mandated to create or organize their respective ADACs. 5

- b. PADAC Provincial Anti-Drug Abuse Council refers to an ADAC created by a multi-7 sector council composed of local officials and representatives of various community 8 organizations tasked to spearhead the planning and implementation, and monitoring of
- 9
- all local anti-drug abuse programs, projects and activities in provincial level. 10

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c. CADAC - City Anti-Drug Abuse Council - refers to an ADAC created by a multi-sector 12 council composed of local officials and representatives of various community 13 organizations tasked to spearhead the planning and implementation, and monitoring of 14 all local anti-drug abuse programs, projects and activities in highly urbanized cities and 15 independent component cities. 16

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d. MADAC - Municipal City Anti-Drug Abuse Council - refers to an ADAC created by a 18 multi-sector council composed of local officials and representatives of various community 19 organizations tasked to spearhead the planning and implementation, and monitoring of 20 all local anti-drug abuse programs, projects and activities in municipal city level. 21

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e. BADAC - Barangay Anti-Drug Abuse Council - refers to an ADAC created by a multisector council composed of local officials and representatives of various community organizations tasked to spearhead the planning and implementation, and monitoring of all local anti-drug abuse programs, projects and activities in barangay level.

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f. Anti-Drug Abuse Office – refers to an office established at the provincial, city, and 28 municipality level which shall institutionalize all ADAC activities and serve as the ADAC 29

- secretariat in charge of unifying and consolidating all local anti- illegal drug programs,
- 2 projects and activities.
- g. Person Who Uses Drugs (PWUDs) refers to a person who uses any dangerous drugs
- 4 by injecting intravenously or intramuscularly, or who consumes any dangerous drugs,
- 5 either by shewing, smoking, sniffing, eating, swallowing, drinking or otherwise
- 6 introducing into the physiological system of the body, as defined by Republic Act No.
- 7 9165.

h. Drug Rehabilitation Program- shall consists of the following:

I. Medical Rehabilitation - refers to the process of helping substance/drug addicted individuals to stop compulsive/drug seeking and use, which may involve a series of bio-psycho-social interventions provided by health professionals to remove toxins in the body and modify behavior of the substance/drug dependent.

II. Reformatory Rehabilitation - refers to rectifying or modifying negative attitude and behavior to enable the person to be a more productive and acceptable member of the society, which may include facilitating the reintegration of the individual back to his/her family and eventually to the society.

III. Community-based Drug Rehabilitation Program – refers to an integrated model for drug users with mild severity of addiction. It provides a continuum of care from outreach and low threshold services through active coordination among a number of health, social and other non-specialist services needed to meet the client's need. It is composed of two core components namely Community-based Treatment and Community-based Support Services.

**Sec. 3.** *Duties and Responsibilities of LGUs*. Each LGU shall have the following duties and responsibilities:

1 2 1. Activate, strengthen, and ensure functionality of its ADAC;

- 2. Approve a comprehensive Local Anti-Drug Plan of Action (LAPDA) to eliminate drug 3 affection with corresponding targets per quarter, as included in the local POPS plan such
- as, but not limited to: 5

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- a. Capacity development programs for all stakeholders through prevention 6 education; 7
- b. Drug clearing operation; 8
- c. After care and reintegration programs; and 9
- d. Advocacy programs on the effects and legal consequences of illegal drugs, 10 role of family and the youth in the fight against illegal drugs, among others. 11

3. Appropriate substantial amount of funds not lower than two percent (2%) of the annual 13 appropriations for anti-illegal drug-related programs, activities, and operations as 14 mandatory item in their budgets; 15

4. All local government units, except barangays, shall create an Anti-Drug Abuse Office 17 with plantilla position; and 18

5. Perform and accomplish all any other tasks delegated upon it by law or by appropriate 20 issuance which are related to its core functions. 21

## Sec. 4. Role and Responsibilities of ADACs:

a) Formulate ADAC LAPDA which contains lists of programs, projects, and activities with 25 corresponding budgetary requirements and timeline; 26

- b) Initiate, coordinate and monitor the implementation of anti-illegal drug programs,
- 2 projects and activities in their area of jurisdiction;
- 3 c) Recommend to the local sanggunian the adoption of measures for the enactment of
- 4 appropriate legislations on anti-illegal drug programs;

- 6 d) Conduct a meeting at least once a month, or as often as maybe necessary at the
- 7 discretion of the ADAC Chairman, and/or upon request of the majority of the members
- 8 of the council;

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- 10 e) Serve as an information-gathering mechanism which will monitor and report to
- appropriate authorities suspicious illegal drug personalities, facilities and activities within
- 12 their jurisdiction;

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- 14 f) Monitor the implementation of Anti-Illegal Drug programs and link information to
- decisions and actions by the concerned central government authorities. In this regard,
- 16 BADAC shall submit monthly reports to concerned MADAC/CADAC. CADAC/MADAC shall
- submit semestral and annual monitoring and evaluation reports to the concerned PADAC;
- 18 and

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- g) Perform other functions as may be assigned by law and implementing rules and
- 21 regulations.

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- Sec. 5. *The Provincial Anti-Drug Abuse Council (PADAC).* A Provincial Anti- Drug
- 24 Abuse Council (PADAC) is hereby created in every province. The PADAC shall be

6 c) Receive the consolidated information report from the BADAC Chair;

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8 d) Review the consolidated reports of cluster leaders for final consolidation and 9 submission to PDEA;

e) Maintain a list of endorsement or referral of Barangay Duty Officer as to who are drug dependents for screening using any internationally accepted screening tool;

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- 14 f) Establish one-stop-shop facilities where assessment, interview, counselling, referral,
- and/or processing of applications for petitions for confinement of drug dependents and
- 16 PWUDs who surrendered for treatment and rehabilitation and other allied processes may
- 17 be undertaken;

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- 19 g) Designate a focal person who shall ensure the compliance and enforcement of
- 20 Dangerous Drugs Board (DDB) Regulations on Voluntary Surrender of Drug Users and
- 21 Dependents and shall coordinate with the appropriate service provider to assure
- 22 compliance with the prescribed intervention;

- 24 h) Ensure that PWUDs who surrendered shall undergo screening in order to determine
- 25 the level of risk and and/or co-morbidities and refer them to the appropriate intervention;

- 28 cause the processing and filing of petitions for confinement of drug dependents and
- 29 PWUD who surrendered for treatment and rehabilitation before the Regional Trial Courts

6	Sec. 13. Roles and Responsibilities of the BADAC. All BADACs shall have the

9	/Municipal Field Office;

11	b) Set quarterly targets to reduce the level of drug affectation and ultimately achieve
12	drug-free status and maintain the status of drug-cleared and unaffected barangays;
13	
14	c) Empower through the community in reporting drug related cases through an
15	Award/Commendation System;
16	
17	d) Equip Barangay Tanods on their roles and functions in the campaign against street-
18	level illegal drug trade through seminars or trainings;
19	
20	e) Identify drug-affected places (i.e. workplace, house clusters, and streets) within their
21	respective barangays where there are violations of R.A. No. 9165 and immediately report
22	the same to the PNP or PDEA;

24	f) Determine and maintain a record of the names and other pertinent information of
25	residents, and likewise, record, update, and monitor all drug- related incidents/cases
26	reported or filed and its effect on the peace and order situation in the barangay including
27	listings of suspected drug users and peddlers;

g) The BADAC, through its chairperson, shall consolidate all information gathered from

all sources, related to any illegal drug activities within the barangay, to include names of

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peddlers, marijuana cultivation, clandestine drug laboratories, and submit immediately to

2 the CADAC/MADAC;

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- 4 h) Ensure existence and operation of barangay rehabilitation referral system, through the
- 5 Barangay Rehabilitation and Referral Desk, intended for drug users and dependents who
- 6 voluntarily surrendered;
- 7 i) Assist PWUDs who surrendered to Barangay Rehabilitation and Referral Desk and refer
- 8 to CADAC/MADAC and other institutions for appropriate action;

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- j) Monitor individuals who are undertaking Community-Based Rehabilitation Treatment
- and Rehabilitation through their attendance and completion of CBRP requirements;

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- 13 k) Conduct regular and consultative meetings at least once a month and call for special
- meetings with organizations in the barangay, such as the Parents Teachers Community
- Association (PTCA), youth groups, Boy and Girl Scouts, religious organizations, senior
- 16 citizens, homeowners, and neighborhood associations, puroks, Tricycle Operators and
- 17 Drivers Association (TODA) and other groups existing in the community to ensure their
- commitment to assist in curbing the drug menace in the community, whenever necessary;

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- 20 I) Formulate prevention education programs and ensure implementation of the same in
- coordination with various associations stated in paragraph 13 (k) herein using funds
- which shall be derived from the Local School Board and other available sources;

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m) Conduct an Information Education Campaign (IC) on illegal drug demand reduction;

- operations should sign the inventory of seized drugs and paraphernalia as witness;

1 2 p) Submit annual Accomplishment Report and Fund Utilization Report to the CADAC/MADAC, the higher Peace and Order Council and the DILG Field Office; 3 4 q) Submit reports on the implementation of BADAC Plan of Action on drug clearing 5 6 operations; r) Create a Barangay Auxiliary Team whose responsibilities and membership shall be 7 included in the Implementing Rules and Regulations of this Act; and 8 9 10 s) Perform other related functions as prescribed by the rules and regulations. 11 Sec. 14. The Anti-Drug Abuse Office (ADAO). An Anti-Drug Abuse Office (ADAO) is 12 hereby created in every City and Municipality. 13 14 Sec. 15. ADAO Executive Director. 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Sec. 17. Staff Support for the ADAOs. Each ADAO shall have at least two (2) support staff in order to help fulfill its duties and responsibilities.

- 1 **Sec. 18.** *Penal Provisions.* Failure of the responsible Local Chief Executive to comply
- with the creation of the ADAC and the implementation of this Act shall be penalized with
- 3 imprisonment ranging from six (6) months and one (1) day to six (6) years with the
- 4 accessory penalty of perpetual absolute disqualification to hold public office.
- 5 **Sec. 19.** *Implementing Rules and Regulations.* The DILG, in coordination with
- 6 DSWD, DepEd, PNP, PDEA, DDB, and DOH shall issue the Implementing Rules and
- 7 Regulations within ninety (90) days from the effectivity of this Act.

- 9 **Sec. 20.** *Appropriations.* The implementation of this Act shall be through an
- appropriation by Congress to the Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG)
- in the General Appropriations Act.

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- 13 Sec. 21. Separability Clause. If any provision or part hereof is held invalid or
- unconstitutional, the remainder of the provisions not otherwise affected shall remain valid
- and subsisting.

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- 17 **Sec. 22.** *Repealing Clause.* The funding provision under RA 9165, Art VII, Sec. 51 is
- hereby repealed and all laws, decrees, rules and regulations, or parts thereof.

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- Sec. 23. *Effectivity.* This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in
- 21 the Official Gazette or in a newspaper of general circulation.
