


EXPLANATORY NOTE

The State acknowledges that education plays a vital role in the development of civil society. This premium on education finds support in Section 4(5), Article XIV of the 1987 Constitution, which provides that *"The State shall assign the highest budgetary priority to education and ensure that teaching will attract and retain its rightful share of the best available talents through adequate remuneration and other means of job satisfaction and fulfillment"*.

The attempts to enact a Magna Carta for students during the previous Congress have not resulted into a concrete law providing for the rights of students. It is imperative that the rights and responsibilities of students be taken up *immediately by the Senate if we are to comply with the Constitutional mandate to recognize the vital role of youth in nation building and the right of student youth to quality education relevant to the needs of the people and society.*



**AN ACT
PROVIDING FOR A MAGNA CARTA FOR STUDENTS**

Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

1 **SECTION 1. Title.** - This Act shall be known as the "Magna Carta for Students".

2 **SEC. 2. Definition of Terms.** - For the purpose of this Act, the following terms shall mean:

3 (a) Student - any person enrolled in and regularly attending school in the secondary, post-
4 secondary, graduate and post-graduate level.

5 (b) School - shall mean any educational institution offering any or all courses in the
6 abovementioned levels, private or public.

7 (c) School Campus - shall mean all contiguous or proximate buildings, grounds and their
8 facilities designated by the institution's or school's rules and regulations as the areas or facilities for use by
9 the students.

10 **SEC. 3. Admission Subject to No Other Restraint.** - Subject to fair, reasonable and equitable
11 admission and academic requirements, no student shall be denied admission to any school on account of
12 his physical handicap, social status, political or religious beliefs.

13 **SEC. 4. Rights of Students.** - In addition to their constitutionally guaranteed political rights and
14 subject to the limitations prescribed by law and jurisprudence, students in all schools shall enjoy the
15 following rights:

16 (a) The right to receive relevant quality education, in line with the needs of the people and
17 society, through competent instruction;

18 (b) The right to freely choose their field of study, subject to existing curricula, and to pursue their
19 studies until graduation, except in cases of academic deficiency or violation of disciplinary regulations;

1 (c) The right to school guidance and counseling services to help them make decisions and
2 select the alternatives in fields of work according to their potentialities;

3 (d) The right to access their own school records, the confidentiality of which the school shall
4 maintain and preserve. Such right shall be subject, however, to reasonable regulations such as the time of
5 viewing;

6 (e) The right to the issuance of official certificates, diplomas, transcript of records, grades,
7 transfer credentials and other similar documents within thirty (30) days from the date request was received
8 by the school administrators and officials concerned;

9 (f) The right to publish a student newspaper and similar publications, as well as the right to
10 conduct assemblies, symposia and other activities of similar nature;

11 (g) The right to free expression of opinions and suggestions, and to effective channels of
12 communication with appropriate academic and administrative bodies of the school or institution;

13 (h) The right to form, establish, join and participate in organization and societies recognized by
14 the school to enhance their intellectual, cultural, spiritual and physical growth and development, or to form,
15 establish, join and maintain organizations and societies for purposes not contrary to law;

16 (i) The right to be free from involuntary contributions, except those approved by their own
17 organizations or societies;

18 (j) Every student shall be free from any form of unreasonable search and seizure within the
19 school campus. Except form the following instances, no search and seizure of a student shall be deemed
20 valid:

21 (i) searches made at the point of ingress and egress by authorized personnel of the
22 school;

23 (ii) search and seizures of illegal articles or articles violative of the school's rules and
24 regulations falling in the plain view of duly authorized personnel;

25 (iii) search and seizures of articles that are illegal or violative of the school's rules and
26 regulations discovered inadvertently by duly authorized personnel;

27 (iv) searches made when the student is about to commit, is committing or has just
28 committed a crime or a serious infraction of the school's rules and regulations; or

29 (v) searches made with a valid search warrant;

1 Articles seized in violation of the abovementioned right may not be used as evidence
2 against the student in any disciplinary action that may be brought against him.

3 (k) The right to the observance of administrative due process in any disciplinary action against
4 a student;

5 (l) The right to freedom of intellectual inquiry within the campus shall be respected and
6 students shall not be subjected to any form of indoctrination, ideological or otherwise;

7 (m) The right to adequate, safe and clean housing facilities within or near the school campus;
8 and

9 (n) The right to be consulted and be informed about tuition fee increases ninety (90) days
10 before their effectivity.

11 **SEC. 5. Student Government.** - The State shall ensure the democratic exercise of student
12 governments. There shall be one central student council/government for each school or campus. It shall
13 have its own set of officers elected in annual popular elections and it shall have the right to determine its
14 policies and programs on student activities, subject to the provisions of the charter governing it.

15 **SEC. 6. Student Government Charter or Constitution.** - The contents of the student government
16 charter shall be determined by representatives of students and the school's student affairs department.

17 **SEC. 7. Student Council Fees.** - The school administration shall assist the student
18 council/government in financial matters through the collection of student council/government fees from
19 students. Such funds shall be turned over to the student council/government after thirty (30) days from the
20 last day of registration at the start of every school year. The student council shall thereupon, be
21 accountable to the student body for such funds.

22 **SEC. 8. Student Representation in Policy Making Body.** - As far as practicable and consistent
23 with the school's rules and regulations, there shall be student representative in the policy-formulating body
24 of the school. The Chairman of the central student council/government shall automatically be the student
25 representative to the policy-making body. He shall have the same rights as that of a regular member, but
26 his privileges shall be limited to reimbursements for actual expenses in attending meetings.

27 **SEC. 9. Accreditation and Supervision of Student Organizations.** - There shall be a Board that
28 shall take charge of the accreditation of student organizations in the school campus. It shall be composed
29 of a representative from the student government, one from the school administration and another from the

1 guidance and counseling office. All campus organizations shall be under the supervision of such Board
2 which shall form part of any existing student affairs department.

3 **SEC. 10. *No Use of Force and Exaction of Student Fees by Student Organizations.*** - All campus
4 organizations shall be prohibited from using any form of force or violence in the initiation of its members
5 and from exacting excessive fees from its members.

6 **SEC. 11. *Student Publications.*** - Students shall have the right to publish student newspapers
7 free from outside interference and censorship. Pursuant thereto, no individual who is not a staff member of
8 the student publication shall determine its content. The editor shall take full responsibility for the contents
9 of the publication, including civil and criminal liability. The selection of the student editor and the staff
10 members shall be made by competitive examinations. The student editor shall enjoy security of tenure.

11 **SEC. 12. *Duty of School Authorities and Student Editorial Staff.*** - It shall be the duty of both the
12 school authorities and student editorial staff to ensure that the school paper shall remain independent,
13 express and advance the ideas, views and sentiments of the students and the same shall be published
14 regularly.

15 It shall be the responsibility of the school administration to assist the student paper/organ in its
16 financial matters through collection of student paper/organ fees from the students. Such funds shall be
17 held in trust for the unhampered use in the publication of the student paper or organ.

18 The student editorial staff shall observe the ethics of professional journalism. It shall be the
19 responsibility of the student editorial staff to ensure that the student paper/organ be not used for purposes
20 contrary to law.

21 **SEC. 13. *Guarantee of Demilitarized School Campuses.*** - Except in cases of national or local
22 emergencies, such as war, natural calamities or if the prevailing situation so requires, a military detachment
23 may only be installed or maintained in campuses after the school authorities concerned have been duly
24 consulted, informed and advised within a reasonable period of time.

25 **SEC. 14. *Duties and Responsibilities of Students.*** - Every student shall:

26 (a) Exercise his rights responsibly knowing that he is responsible for any infringement of the
27 rights of others and violation of laws and regulations;

28 (b) Abide by the rules of his school governing academic excellence and peace and order;

1 (c) Make full use and advantage of his opportunities for education in order that he may become
2 an asset to his family and may be of service to society;

3 (d) Refrain from defacing any part of the school campus or destroying any other property or
4 facilities of the school which are used by the student body in general. He must also refrain from using any
5 part of the campus or school property including bulletin boards or the student paper for illegal or immoral
6 activities; and

7 (e) Observe proper conduct and decorum outside the school campus so as not to blemish his
8 school's name and reputation.

9 **SEC. 15. Administrative.** - The Department of Education (DepEd) shall create a multi-sectoral
10 body composed of representatives of DepEd, the school's administration and the student body to
11 promulgate the necessary regulations to monitor the different school campuses to ensure that student
12 rights are protected. When there is a final finding of a school's willful and repetitious infringement of
13 student's rights, the body shall recommend to the proper agency of the DepEd the suspension or
14 cancellation of its license.

15 **SEC. 16. Repealing Clause.** - All laws, decrees, acts, regulations and rules or parts thereof
16 which are inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

17 **SEC. 17. Separability Clause.** - If any provision of the Act is declared unconstitutional or the
18 application thereof to any person, circumstance or transaction is held invalid, the validity of the remaining
19 provisions of the Act, and the applicability of such provisions to other persons, circumstances or
20 transactions shall not be affected thereby.

21 **SEC. 18. Effectivity.** - This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in the *Official*
22 *Gazette* or in two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
