## RESOLUTION DIRECTING THE APPROPRIATE SENATE COMMITTEE TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY IN AID OF LEGISLATION ON THE OUTBREAK OF VACCINE-PREVENTABLE DISEASES SUCH AS PERTUSSIS

**WHEREAS,** the Philippine Constitution declares that the State shall protect and promote the right to health of people and instill health consciousness among them;

**WHEREAS**, Pertussis, also known as whooping cough, is a contagious respiratory infection caused by a bacteria—either *Bordetella pertussis*, or *Bordetella parapertussis*. Pertussis starts as a mild cough and cold that lasts about two (2) weeks, followed by paroxysms or fits of coughing which lasts up to six (6) weeks;

**WHEREAS,** episodes of numerous rapid coughs followed by a crowing or highpitched whoop coughing usually characterizes Pertussis, together with low-grade fever and/or vomiting. Infants are the most vulnerable age group to this disease, due to their underdeveloped immune system;

**WHEREAS**, the Department of Health (DOH) is closely monitoring the cases of Pertussis in the Philippines. From January 1 to March 30, 2024, data shows a total of one thousand one hundred twelve (1,112) cases with fifty-four (54) fatalities. The sharp rise of Pertussis cases was also seen in other countries such as the United Kingdom in Europe;

**WHEREAS,** DOH stated that, "The World Health Organization Regional Office in the Western Pacific confirmed that measles and Pertussis are concerns of many countries, because lockdowns during the COVID-19 pandemic hampered routine vaccination";

WHEREAS, Pertussis is a vaccine-preventable disease. According to DOH Secretary Teodoro Herbosa, the government has an existing stock of pentavalent vaccines—or five-in-one shots that immunize the body against Pertussis, Diphtheria, Tetanus, Hepatitis B, and Haemophilus influenza type B. However, despite the availability of these vaccines, government stocks run low, prompting the DOH to request assistance from the private sector in resolving the Pertussis vaccine supply shortage;

**WHEREAS,** early detection measures on a possible outbreak, identification of issues on vaccine supply chain, and addressing vaccine hesitancy should have been implemented at the outset to prevent a full-blown outbreak which now resulted to multiple fatalities;

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, as it hereby resolved, to direct the appropriate Senate Committee to conduct an inquiry in aid of legislation on the outbreak of Pertussis despite being a vaccine-preventable disease already covered by DOH vaccination programs, including the issue on the shortage of the vaccine supply.
