RESOLUTION

DIRECTING THE APPROPRIATE SENATE COMMITTEE TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, ON THE ALLEGED SALE OF DEGREES TO FOREIGN STUDENTS IN CAGAYAN PROVINCE, FOR THE PURPOSE OF DETERMINING THE VERACITY OF THE SAID ALLEGATIONS AND THE NECESSITY OF PROPOSING RECOMMENDATIONS ON EXISTING POLICIES OR CRAFTING COMPLEMENTARY OR AMENDATORY LEGISLATION

WHEREAS, it is enshrined in the 1987 Constitution that the State shall establish, maintain, and support a complete, adequate, and integrated system of education relevant to the needs of the people and society. It is likewise declared that academic freedom shall be enjoyed in all institutions of higher learning;

WHEREAS, pursuant to these State policies, Republic Act (R.A.) No. 7722, otherwise known as the "Higher Education Act of 1994", 1 created the Commission on Higher Education (CHED), independent and separate from the Department of Education (formerly the Department of Education, Culture and Sports), and attached to the Office of the President solely for administrative purposes. The CHED shall cover both public and private

institutions of higher education as well as degree-granting programs in all post-secondary educational institutions, public and private;

WHEREAS, in R.A. No. 11448, otherwise known as the "Transnational Higher Education Act",² the State shall endeavor to modernize the Philippine higher education sector, and bring international quality standards and expertise into the country, with a view to making higher education globally competitive, attracting a flow of talented students, faculty, and staff and improving the country's human resource base;

 WHEREAS, the entry and stay of foreign students in the Philippines are governed by Executive Order No. 285, s. 2000³ and its Implementing Rules and Regulations, and Joint Memorandum Order No. 01, s. 2017⁴ of the Inter-Agency Committee on Foreign Students (IACFS);

 WHEREAS, on April 17, 2024, news broke out that some of the mainland Chinese students in the Province of Cagayan are reportedly shelling out P2 million to obtain their degrees, as reported by Professor Chester Cabalza of the University of the Philippines. Some of these students allegedly do not even bother to attend their classes;⁵

WHEREAS, Cagayan Governor Manuel Mamba said that these Chinese students in the province entered the country legally to pursue their studies under a partnership between Chinese learning institutions and the CHED;⁶

WHEREAS, CHED clarified that the involved university in this issue,

1 particularly Saint Paul University Philippines (SPUP) - Tuguegarao City, was

2 granted autonomous status by CHED since 2002 and has an Authority to

3 Accept Foreign Students by the Bureau of Immigration (BI).7 SPUP also has

4 the authority, among others, to establish linkages with recognized foreign

5 higher education institutions (HEIs);8

WHEREAS, CHED claimed that it has not received complaints as to any violation of SPUP of the IACFS Joint Memorandum, which shall be forwarded to IACFS for its appropriate action;⁹

 WHEREAS, the BI data shows that a total of 1,516 Chinese were granted student visas in Cagayan in 2023. All the Chinese students were endorsed by a major Philippine university. However, BI received reports that only 400 Chinese students are onsite because of the implementation of distance learning;¹⁰

WHEREAS, in the April 19, 2024 statement of CHED, it strongly urged Professor Cabalza to formalize his complaint with the necessary evidence against SPUP with CHED. CHED will not hesitate to start an investigation and ensure that due process is observed for all involved parties. In parallel, CHED reaffirms its commitment to ensuring that academic institutions under its purview operate within the bounds of Philippine laws and regulations and in concern with the nation's interests;¹¹

WHEREAS, while the State strongly supports the internationalization in education, any practice allowing the proliferation of diploma mills in the

country must not be allowed. The sale of said degrees undermines the government efforts to improve the quality of education in the country, diminishes the credibility of our HEIs, and tarnishes the integrity of the diplomas granted to local or foreign students graduating from these institutions;

WHEREAS, it is within the powers and functions of the CHED to impose appropriate penalties or sanctions on HEIs and their officials who condone such practices. The message must be clearly sent to the international community that Philippine diplomas are not, and never will be, for sale;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE PHILIPPINES, to direct the appropriate Senate Committee to conduct an inquiry, in aid of legislation, on the alleged sale of degrees to foreign students in Cagayan Province, for the purpose of determining the veracity of the said allegations and the necessity of proposing recommendations on existing policies or crafting complementary or amendatory legislation.
