EXPLANATORY NOTE

Coconut products are still the number one agricultural export earner of our country. More than twenty million Filipinos all over the country depend on the planting and harvesting of coconuts for their living.

Due to the recent glut of palm oil in the world market and typhoons that hit the country last year, our coconut farmers are in desperate straits. In Southern Tagalog alone, copra sale went down from P22.40 per kg in 2004 to P18.28 per kg. in 2006. Government expects coconut production to stay flat this year at 2.4 million. Given the situation, farmers are no longer harvesting coconuts. More farmers cut trees and sell them as lumber, instead of harvesting the coconut.

If this low copra selling price and production continues, the coconut industry will collapse. This calamity requires emergency action, in order to provide immediate and long-term relief to coconut farmers suffering from the effects of abnormally low prices of copra and other coconut products.

The proposed emergency measure Program will involve the following projects:

- Income Supplement Projects, for coconut farmers to sell their copra and whole nuts at millgate price or better, as follows:
- Transport allowance to coconut farmers, for government to shoulder the difference between farmgate and millgate prices, worth P38.25 million a month;
- Marketing assistance to coconut farmers, including transport equipment assistance to coconut farmer organizations and accredited oil mills, worth P236.2 million;
- Direct buying of copra by National Food Authority at a threshold price determined by the Philippine Coconut Authority;
- Income support on regular sales of copra and whole nuts, directly benefiting 1.6 million coconut farmers through the issuance of coupons.

It is only through a timely and critical intervention can we save the coconut industry - and the farmers who depend on this industry for their living - and help them overcome this debilitating crisis.

For the above-mentioned reasons, approval of this bill is earnestly urged.

AN ACT ESTABLISHING AN EMERGENCY MEASURE TO ALLEVIATE THE PLIGHT OF COCONUT FARMERS ADVERSELY AFFECTED BY LOW PRICES OF COPRA AND OTHER COCONUT PRODUCTS, AND PROVIDING FUNDS THEREFOR

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION 1. Title of the Act. - This Act shall be known as the Coconut Emergency Measures Act of 2007.

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SECTION 2. Purpose of the Act. - In order to immediately address the abnormal price situation in the coconut industry sector brought by the worldwide glut of fats and oils in the world market, there is a need to launch an income supplement program for small coconut farmers, tillers, workers and owner-cultivators who comprise the overwhelming majority of the people in the coconut industry that will provide them immediate relief from the adverse effects of extremely low prices of copra and husked nuts.

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SECTION 3. Definition of Terms. - As used in this Act, "coconut farmers" refers to small coconut farmers, tillers, workers and owner-cultivators who comprise the overwhelming majority of the people in the coconut industry.

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SECTION 4. Assistance Provided to Coconut Farmers.- By virtue of this Act, coconut farmers and coconut processing sector shall be provided the following assistance:

- 20 (a) Income Supplement Projects, for coconut farmers to sell their copra 21 and husked nuts at millgate price or better, as follows:
 - (1) Transport allowance to coconut farmers where government shoulders the costs of transport of copra and husked nuts

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18	SECTION 9 Separability Clause If any provision of this Act shall
19	be declared unconstitutional or invalid, the other provisions not otherwise
20	affected shall remain in full force and effect.
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 ${\bf SECTION}$ 10. Effectivity Clause. - This Act shall take effect fifteen

days after its publication in two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
