EXPLANATORY NOTE

Section 12, Article XII (Social Justice and Human Rights) of the Constitution provides as follows:

Sec.12 The State shall establish and maintain an effective food and drug regulatory system and undertake appropriate health manpower development and research, responsive to the country's health needs and problems.

The country currently faces a looming crisis in health services due to the unabated migration of health and medical professionals lured by higher salaries, better working conditions and more opportunities for professional growth in foreign countries. The Philippines now holds the dubious distinction of being the top exporter of nurses. Doctors are also leaving the country in droves. Of late, many doctors have even opted to go back to school to become certified nurses just to get out of the country to work elsewhere.

Reports are rife that hospitals in rural areas in Visayas and Mindanao face imminent closure because of the lack of doctors and nurses. Even prestigious medical institutions find it difficult to attract fresh graduates to fill up slots for doctors. The government has acknowledged the reality that, indeed, the country is facing an alarming shortage of medical doctors and other medical professionals.

Since medical doctors constitute the core of a country's public health service system, the shortage of doctors severely prejudices the capacity of government to deliver timely, adequate, competent and affordable medical and health care services to our people, especially the poor who direly need such services but can hardly afford them, and whose only access to such services is through the public health service system.

Thus, there is an urgent need to create a steadily expanding pool of medical doctors to strengthen and expand the core of the public health service system through institutional mechanisms and programs that will not only enable a greater number of qualified and public-service oriented young people to pursue medical education but also systematically and effectively ensure their integration into the public health service system in such manner that would harness their talents within an optimum period of time for the benefit of our country and people.

This bill seeks to address that need by creating a Philippine Medical Academy and establishing a Philippine Medical Scholarship and Service Program. The Academy shall provide the institutional mechanism for the envisioned sustained human resource development for the Philippine public health care system and the scholarship program shall provide the financial and other educative resource support mechanisms for the pursuit of studies in the field of medicine of deserving and qualified young people. The University of the Philippines, through its College of Medicine, shall serve as the institutional core or principal medical educational institution within which grantees or scholars of the program shall pursue their medical training and studies.

The government shall provide the physical, technical and financial resources to equip, man, and develop the U.P. College of Medicine as the institutional core of the Philippine Medical Academy. It shall also provide funds to pay for all the necessary expenses such as tuition, matriculation and all other school fees, prescribed textbooks and other educational supplies and equipments, board and lodging expenses, clothing and uniform allowances, traveling expenses and other related miscellaneous living allowances of qualified entrants to the Philippine Medical Academy and recipients of the scholarship program.

It is envisioned that upon passing the medical board examination, a scholar shall spend his/her post-graduate internship in a public health institution to commence his/her integration into the public health service system and shall accordingly be given the appropriate rank and salary. Such integration into the public service system shall be mandatory for a period equivalent to at least two (2) years for each year of scholarship benefits received.

The Academy and the Scholarship program shall be administered by a Board empowered to formulate and implement policies, rules and regulations, and all such other activities for the effective Management and Development of the Academy and the Scholarship program.

In view of the foregoing, the immediate passage of this bill is earnestly sought.

AN ACT CREATING THE PHILIPPINE MEDICAL ACADEMY AND ESTABLISHING THE PHILIPPINE MEDICAL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR

Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

1 SECTION 1. Short Title. – This Act shall be known as the "Philippine

2 Medical Academy and Scholarship Act".

SEC. 2. Declaration of Policy.- It is the policy of the State to undertake health manpower development responsive to the country's health service needs. Towards this end, the State shall establish mechanisms inclusive of creating educative institutions and scholarship programs to enable deserving and qualified individuals to pursue education and training in the field of medicine, and shall formulate and implement such policies and programs to systematically integrate these individuals, upon qualifying as doctors of medicine, into the public heath care system.

SEC. 3. The Philippine Medical Academy. - There shall be created a Philippine 10 Medical Academy (PMA) which shall be the primary educational institutional 11 mechanism for the sustained human resource development for the Philippine Public 12 Health Care System. The government, on its own and, when feasible, in partnership with 13 other lawful entities in the public and private sectors, shall provide and undertake 14 measu8res to generate the necessary financial, technical, physical and other resources 15 needed to efficiently and effectively man, equip, manage and develop the U.P. College of 16 Medicine as the institutional core of the Philippine Medical Academy. Upon fulfillment 17 of prescribed conditions as may be required by the Philippine Medical Academy and 18 Scholarship Board (PMASB), other colleges of medicine may be accredited and 19

integrated into the Philippine Medical Academy as adjunct educative institutions that will
 provide training and education in the field of medicine to qualified entrants to the
 Philippine Medical Academy.

SEC. 4. Medical Scholarship. - There shall be an annual selection, through 4 5 appropriate examinations and screening processes, from among qualified graduating б students of appropriate courses in colleges and universities nationwide, those who shall 7 be admitted to the Philippine Medical Academy to be known as Medical Academy Scholars and who shall be granted scholarship in medicine that shall cover expenses for, 8 among others, tuition, matriculation and other school fees; prescribed textbooks, supplies 9 10 and equipment; board and lodging expenses; clothing and uniform allowances; traveling expenses and other related miscellaneous living allowances, Provided, that at least five 11 (5) candidates per region, or when practicable, one (1) candidate from every province and 12 city shall be chosen to participate in the annual selection and Provided further, that at 13 least fifty (50) candidates shall be selected as "medical academy scholars" annually. 14

15 Sec.5. Qualifications of Candidates. - Candidates for admission into the 16 Philippine Medical Academy and for medical scholarship grants shall possess the 17 following minimum qualifications:

- 18a.Must belong to the top thirty per centum (30%) of their respective19graduating classes and must be completing undergraduate courses20identified by the PMASB as a prerequisite course to the pursuit of21studies in the field of medicine;
- b. Family and or personal incomes are not sufficient to finance their
 education in the field of medicine;

c. Must be in good health and of good moral character; and

d. Must be not more than twenty-five (25) years of age and a natural born
citizen of the Philippines.

Sec. 6. General Conditions for Admission to the Philippine Medical Academy
and for the Scholarship Grant. – A medical Academy scholar shall receive and continue
to enjoy the benefits of the scholarship until he/she completes his/her course, subject to
the following conditions:

1	a.	He /she shall pass the entrance/ admission examinations and related
2		requirements of the College of Medicine of the University of the Philippines;
3	b.	He/she shall enroll in the University of the Philippines College of Medicine
4		and carry the full load of subjects prescribed per semester by the said medical
5		school, and shall, under no circumstance, drop a course which will result in
6		under-loading; and
7	с.	He/she shall be allowed, for valid reasons preventing his/her enrolment, to
8		defer availing of the scholarship and/or to file a leave of absence for a period
9		equivalent to and/ or not exceeding one school year.
10	d.	He/she shall sign an agreement stating the terms and conditions of the
11		scholarship on a form prescribed by the Philippine Medical Academy
12		Scholarship Board;
13	e.	He/she shall repay the full amount of scholarship funds and benefits received
14		and spent for his/her benefit and the scholarship shall be terminated in the
15		event the grantee accepts another scholarship from other government or
16		private agencies or entities; and
17	f.	He/she shall also repay the full amount of scholarship funds and benefits
18		received and spent for his/her benefit in case of failure to complete the
19		medical course without valid cause, Provided that, if such failure is due to
20		academic failings, physical and mental disabilities and incapacities, and such
21		other reasonable causes, and he/she pursues and completes another course to
22		qualify him/her as a medical service practitioner, he/she may choose, instead
23		of repayment of scholarship benefits, to render services and be integrated into
24		the public health service system for a period equivalent to two (2) years of
25		service for every year of scholarship availed.
26	Se	c.7. – Medical Service Program. – The scholar shall, pursuant to the agreement
27	provided	in Section 6 hereof, render services and be integrated into the public health

27 provided in Section 6 hereof, render services and be integrated into the public health 28 service system as medical doctor, with the appropriate rank and salary upon his/her 29 passing of the medical board examination; Provided, that such service and integration in 30 the public health service system shall be mandatory for a period equivalent to at least two (2) years per year of scholarship availed and within which period, the scholar is granted
periodic promotion and advancement in rank and salary grade at least one rank higher at
least every three years in the service; and Provided, further that he/she shall undertake
post graduate internship in a public health or medical institution and such internship shall
be part of the mandatory service and integration into the public health service system.

6 Sec. 8. Philippine Medical Academy Scholarship Board (PMASB). – There is 7 hereby created a Philippine Medical Academy and Scholarship Board (PMASB) which 8 shall administer the Philippine Medical Academy and the Scholarship and Service 9 Program and shall be empowered to formulate, consolidate, integrate, systematize and 10 implement all policies, rules and regulations and programs related thereto and intended to 11 enhance the effectiveness thereof.

12 The PMASB shall be composed of the Chairperson of the Commission on Higher 13 Education, The Secretary of Education, The Secretary of Health, The Secretary of Budget 14 and Management, The President of the University Of the Philippine System, The Dean of 15 the College of Medicine of the University of the Philippines and the Chairpersons of the 16 Committees on Health and Higher Education of the House of Representatives and the 17 Senate. The members of the PMASB shall be entitled to reasonable amounts of per 18 diems, representation, travel and transportation allowances.

19 The Chairman of the Commission on Higher Education shall be the Chairman of20 the Board.

Sec. 9. Functions of the Board.- The PMASB shall have the following functions:
 a. Determine, formulate and promulgate the appropriate policies, measures, rules
 and regulations necessary to operate, manage, maintain, and enhance the
 effectiveness of the PMA and the scholarship and services programs integral
 to its operations;

b. Establish cooperative and coordinative linkages with other educational and
 related institutions in the public and private sectors to ensure the effective
 operation, management and development of the PMA and the scholarship and
 services programs;

1	c.	Prescribe such tests, standards and/or criteria for the selection of medical
2		scholars; and the relevant and appropriate terms a and conditions governing
3		the availment of scholarship grants and the integration of qualified medical
4		scholars into the public health service system;
5	d.	Determine the various expenses to be covered by the scholarship, and approve
6		the timely payment thereof to medical scholars from such sums appropriated
7		by law and such other funds available for the purpose;
8	e.	Approve the staffing pattern and salary and/or compensation of officers and
9		personnel of the Secretariat;
10	f.	Conduct regular meetings at least twice a month, or upon the call of the
11		Chairman of the Board; and
12	g.	Perform such other duties and functions as hereinafter be assigned to it by the
13		President of the Philippines.
14	Se	c. 10. Secretariat There shall be a Secretariat to provide administrative and
15	technical a	assistance to the PMASB. It shall be headed by an Executive Director, and its
16	staff shall	be recruited preferably from qualified professionals from the academe and
17	medical p	rofession.
18	Se	c. 11. Appropriation. – The sum of One Hundred Million (P100,000,000.00)
19	pesos is l	nereby authorized to be appropriated to constitute the initial PMSSP Fund.
20	Thereafter	, such additional sums as may be necessary shall be included in the annual
21	General A	ppropriations Act.
22	Se	c. 12. Donations, Grants, etc the Board may accept donations, legacies,
23	grants, and	d other contributions to form part of the Medical Scholarship Fund: Provided,
24 .	that such	donations, legacies, grants, and other contributions shall be exempt from
25	taxation a	nd shall be allowable deductions for income tax purposes. Proceeds from at
