AN ACT TO STRENGTHEN THE UNIVERSITY OF THE PHILIPPINES AS THE NATIONAL STATE UNIVERSITY

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION 1. *Title.* – This Act shall be known as "The University of the Philippines Charter of 2007".

- SEC. 2. Declaration of Policy. The State shall promote, foster, nurture and protect the right of all citizens to accessible quality education. Towards this end, it is the policy of the State to strengthen the University of the Philippines as the national state university.
- SEC. 3. Purpose of the University. As the national state university, a public and secular institution of higher learning and a community of scholars dedicated to the search for truth, knowledge and training/development of future leaders, the University of the Philippines shall perform its unique and distinctive leadership in higher education and national education development. The University shall:
- (a) Lead in setting academic standards and initiating innovations in teaching, research and faculty development in philosophy, the arts and humanities, the social sciences, the professions and engineering, natural sciences, mathematics, and technology; and maintain centers of excellence in such disciplines and professions;

- (b) Serve as a graduate university by providing advanced studies and specialization for scholars, scientists, writers, artists and professionals, especially those who serve on the faculties of State and private colleges and universities:
- (c) Serve as a research university in the various fields of its expertise and specialization by conducting basic and applied research and development, promoting research in the various colleges and universities, and contributing to the dissemination and application of knowledge;
- (d) Lead as a public service university by providing forms of community, public and volunteer service, and scholarly and technical assistance to the government, the private sector and civil society while maintaining its standards of excellence;
- (e) Protect and promote the professional and economic rights and welfare of its academic and nonacademic personnel;
- (f) Provide opportunities for training and learning in progressive leadership, responsible citizenship, and the development of democratic values, institutions and practice, and the enhancement of nationalism and national identity;
- (g) Provide democratic governance in the university based on collegiality, representation, accountability, transparency and active participation of its constituents; and
- (h) Serve as a regional and global university in cooperation with international and scientific unions with networks of universities and scholarly and professional associations in the Asia-Pacific region and around the world.

SEC. 4. Definition of Terms. – As used in this Act, the following terms shall mean:

(a) "University" refers to the University of the Philippines.

- (b) "University of the Philippines System (UPS)" refers to the University of the Philippines as composed by its existing constituent universities, as follows: University of the Philippines Diliman; University of the Philippines Manila; University of the Philippines Los Baños; University of the Philippines Visayas; University of the Philippines Mindanao; University of the Philippines Baguio; University of the Philippines Open University; and those that may be created in the future.
- (c) "University of the Philippines System Assembly (UPSA)" refers to an assembly of individuals representing the students, academic personnel (faculty and research, extension and professional staff), administrative personnel, and alumni of the seven (7) constituent universities (UP Diliman, UP Manila, UP Los Baños, UP Visayas, UP Mindanao, UP Baguio, UP Open University) and other constituent universities that may be created in the future. Members of the assembly shall be elected pursuant to Section 17 hereof.
- (d) "University Assembly (UA)" refers to an assembly of individuals representing the students, academic personnel (faculty and research, extension and professional staff), administrative personnel, and alumni elected by the constituents of a particular constituent university of the University of the Philippines.
- (e) "Research, Extension and Professional Staff (REPS)" refers to University personnel who perform academic nonteaching duties. These include University researchers, extension personnel, law reform group, law education group, science education, guidance service group, library service group, development management group, and museum research group.
- (f) "Academic freedom" refers to the right of every constituent of the University to express one's ideas, to write, research and publish, and act in

accordance with one's viewpoint inside and outside the classroom in the pursuit of academic ideals and in service to the Filipino people.

- (g) "Professorial chair awards" refers to awards given to faculty members for meritorious performance in teaching, research, creative writing; one of the highest forms of recognition for achievement in the academe; holders of these awards deliver a lecture or publish a paper in a scholarly journal within the period of award and may be named after the donor or after a person that the donor may wish to honor.
- (h) "Established religious beliefs" refers to mandatory spiritual and theological practices, convictions and faith of the University population to make them God-fearing, productive, patriotic citizens conscious of their values and cultural heritage.
- SEC. 5. The University System. The University of the Philippines is a university system and shall be composed of constituent universities established solely by its Board upon the recommendation of the president of the University.
- 17 SEC. 6. Academic Freedom. The University has the right and the responsibility to exercise academic freedom.
 - SEC. 7. Academic Excellence. The University has the responsibility to maintain and enhance its high academic standards in the performance of the functions of instruction, research and extension, and public service.
 - SEC. 8. Social Responsibility. The University is committed to serve the Filipino nation and humanity. While it carries out the obligation to pursue universal principles, it must relate its activities to the needs of the Filipino people and their aspirations for social progress and transformation. The University may provide venues for student volunteerism.
 - SEC. 9. Democratic Access. No student shall be denied admission to the University by reason of age, gender, nationality, religious belief, ethnicity, economic status, political opinion or political affiliation or for being

differently-abled physically. The University shall take affirmative steps to enhance the access of disadvantaged students to its programs and services while maintaining its standards of excellence: *Provided*, That valedictorians of public high schools duly accredited by the Department of Education shall likewise be afforded affirmative action in their admission.

SEC. 10. The Board of Regents. - The governance of the University is vested in the Board of Regents, hereinafter referred to as the Board, of the UPS which shall be composed of:

- (a) The chairperson of the Commission on Higher Education as chairperson;
 - (b) The president of the University as vice chairperson;

- 12 (c) The chairperson of the Senate Committee on Education, Arts and Culture;
 - (d) The chairperson of the House Committee on Higher and Technical Education;
 - (e) The president of the UP Alumni Association, to serve as alumni regent during his/her incumbency in that position;
 - (f) One faculty regent representing all teaching personnel, chosen in accordance with the rules and qualifications set by the constituent university councils, composed of full-time tenured faculty members of the University to serve for a term of two (2) years;
 - (g) One REPS regent representing full-time permanent nonteaching REPS chosen in accordance with the rules and qualifications set by their duly recognized organizations;
 - (h) One student regent to serve for a term of one (1) year chosen in accordance with the rules and qualifications set by the general assembly of recognized university student councils;

(i) One staff regent representing full-time administrative personnel chosen in accordance with the rules and qualifications set by their duly recognized organizations, to serve for a term of two (2) years; and

(j) Three other regents representing the private sector, at least one of whom should be an alumnus of the University, who have distinguished themselves in their professions or fields of specialization chosen from a list of five (5) persons for every vacancy as recommended by a search committee constituted by the president of the University based on standards and guidelines approved by the Board, appointed by the Board and shall each serve for a term of two (2) years: *Provided*, That the regents holding office as members of the Board at the time of the effectivity of this Act shall continue to serve until the expiration of their appointments as provided for in Executive Order No. 204-A issued by the President of the Philippines on July 15, 1987.

In case of vacancy in the representation of the private sector in the Board, such vacancy shall be filled by appointment by the Board as provided in the preceding paragraph, and such appointee shall hold office for the unexpired term. In case of vacancy in the position of sectoral regents, the successor, who shall serve for the unexpired term, shall be chosen in the same manner as provided for the predecessor: *Provided*, That in the case of a sectoral regent, membership in the Board ceases upon suspension, separation or recall from the University.

Members of the Board shall serve without compensation other than the actual and necessary expenses incurred in attendance of meetings of the Board or other official business authorized by the Board.

SEC. 11. *Powers of the Board of Regents.* – The administration of the University and the exercise of its corporate powers are vested in the Board.

The Board shall exercise the following specific powers and duties:

- (a) To define in general terms the thrusts of the University and adopt broad policy guidelines to ensure their implementation;
 - (b) To preserve the integrity of the UPS;

- (c) To approve the creation, institution, merger or abolition of academic units and programs and adopt the necessary measures to enable students to exercise their established religious beliefs consistent with the accepted norms and mores of society. Students shall be given options to fulfill their academic responsibilities such as, but not limited to, make-up classes/examinations on missed school days/examinations which coincided with the exercise of their established religious beliefs, all upon the recommendation of the university council of the constituent university concerned through the president of the University;
- (d) To approve the graduation of students and grant of honors, as recommended by their respective university councils through the president of the University;
- (e) To confer honorary degrees upon persons in recognition of learning, statesmanship, or eminence in literature, science or art, upon the recommendation of a committee created by the president of the University: *Provided*, That such degrees shall not be conferred in consideration of any payment, gift or other valuable consideration;
- (f) To approve the rules on student discipline recommended by the university councils through the president of the University, with the Board retaining the power to review and pass final judgment on student disciplinary cases;
- (g) To create, organize, reorganize, merge or abolish constituent universities, colleges, institutes, and other academic and administrative units of the University;
- (h) To establish professorial chair awards in the colleges and to provide for the maintenance or endowment of such chairs;

(i) To provide fellowships, scholarships and grants, and to award the same to faculty, staff and students giving special evidence of merit;

- (j) To elect the president of the University for a single term of six (6) years without reelection following a process of democratic consultation with the University community based on the guidelines, qualifications and/or standards set by the Board. In the event of a vacancy for whatever reason/s, the Board shall elect a new president who shall serve the unexpired term of the predecessor within six (6) months from the occurrence of the vacancy;
- (k) To appoint faculty members and other officials and employees to draw up a position classification and compensation plan for its faculty and staff; to fix and adjust salaries and benefits of the faculty members and other employees; to determine their hours of service, and such other terms and conditions as it may deem proper; to grant to them, at its discretion, leave of absence, under such regulations as it may promulgate, and other provisions of law to the contrary notwithstanding; and to remove them for cause as provided by law after due investigation and proper hearing;
- (I) To extend, with their consent, the tenure of faculty members of the University beyond the compulsory retirement age, any other provision of law to the contrary notwithstanding, on recommendation of the units upon endorsement of the president of the University, whenever their services are specially needed: *Provided, however*, That no extension of tenure shall be made beyond the age of seventy (70);
- (m) To fix the tuition fees and other necessary school charges, after due consultations and consent of the various student councils of constituent universities as provided for in Section 22 of this Act. Such fees and charges, including government support and other incomes generated by the University, shall constitute special trust funds and shall be deposited in any authorized government depository bank. Any and all interests that shall accrue therefrom shall form part of the same funds for the use of the University.

Any provision of law to the contrary notwithstanding, all incomes 1 generated by the University or by its own subsidiaries may, at the discretion of 2 the Board, be disbursed for the professional growth and development, health. 3 4 welfare and other benefits of the faculty members and other personnel; for the acquisition, construction, maintenance and repair of urgently needed 5 instructional and auxiliary facilities, equipment, buildings and other 6 7 infrastructure; and for expenses necessary for the attainment of its purposes 8 under this Act. If the University, for reasons beyond its control, shall not be 9 able to pursue any project for which funds have been appropriated and allocated under its approved program of expenditures, the Board may 10 authorize the use of said funds for any reasonable purpose which it deems u 12 necessary and urgent for the attainment of the objectives of the University: 13 Provided. That funds collected from students for a specific purpose shall not 14 be reprogrammed to other expenditures:

(n) To receive and appropriate all sums as may be provided by law for the support of the University to the ends specified by law, and other sums in the manner it may, in its discretion, determine to carry out the purposes and functions of the University;

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- (o) To authorize the construction or repair of its buildings, machinery, equipment and other facilities, and the purchase and acquisition of real and personal properties, including the necessary supplies, materials and equipment;
- (p) To receive in trust legacies, gifts and donations of real and personal property of all kinds, and to administer and dispose the same when necessary for the benefit of the University and subject to the instructions of the donor, if any;
- (q) The provisions of law to the contrary notwithstanding, to authorize its faculty and staff to travel abroad in order to study, deliver paper, attend

conferences and disseminate research: *Provided*, That the fellowship, scholarship or grant is authorized by the Board;

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- (r) To exercise the general powers set out in the Corporation Code;
- (s) To delegate any of its powers to the president of the University or any other officials or officers as it may deem necessary;
- (t) To prescribe the rules for its own governance and the discipline of the faculty and other personnel, and to enact for the governance of the University such general policies, rules and regulations, not contrary to law, as are consistent with the purposes of the University; and
- (u) To exercise such other powers as may be necessary and proper to carry out the objectives of this Act.
- SEC. 12. Quorum of the Board of Regents. A simple majority of the actual members of the Board holding office at the time the meeting is called shall constitute a quorum.
- SEC. 13. The University President. The University president is the chief academic officer and head of the University faculty and the chief executive officer of the University elected by the Board. Upon the election of the president by the Board, he/she shall immediately be issued appointment papers by the presiding chair of the Board which elected the president. The president shall preside over the meetings of the constituent university councils, if he/she is in attendance. The president shall exercise the powers specifically provided for in this Act, those determined by the Board, those which usually pertain to the office of the president of the University, and those which are related or necessary to its functions. The compensation of the president shall be determined by the Board.
- SEC. 14. The Secretary of the University and of the Board of Regents.

 There shall be a secretary of the University appointed by the Board who shall also be the secretary of the Board and who shall keep such records of the University as may be designated by the Board.

SEC. 15. The University Council. – There shall be in each constituent university a university council consisting of the chancellor as chairperson and all of the faculty members in the University holding the rank of assistant professor and higher and a representative of nontenured teaching personnel.

- SEC. 16. Powers of the University Council. The university council shall be the highest academic body of each constituent university and shall exercise the following powers:
- (a) Fix the requirement for admission to any college or unit, or any academic program or course offering and for graduation and conferment of a degree, and the grant of honors subject to the minimum system-wide requirements;
- (b) Prescribe the academic programs including their institution, revision, abolition and merger, subject to the approval of the Board;
- (c) Recommend to the Board the graduation of students and the grant of honors;
- (d) Exercise disciplinary power over the students and fraternities, through the chancellors or their appropriate committees, subject to review by the president of the University according to the limits prescribed by system-wide rules on student discipline;
- (e) Undertake a periodic review of academic courses, programs, standards, thrusts and policies;
- (f) Adopt the necessary measures to enable students to exercise their established religious beliefs consistent with the accepted norms and mores of society. Students shall be given options to fulfill their academic responsibilities such as, but not limited to, make-up classes/examinations on missed school days/examinations, which coincided with the exercise of their established religious beliefs; and
- (g) Adopt internal rules or procedures consistent with the provisions of this Act.

SEC. 17. The University Consultative Assemblies — There shall be established for the whole UPS, consultative assemblies, as follows:

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- (a) There shall be a college assembly for every college, other degree granting institute composed of representatives coming from the students, academic personnel (faculty and REPS), and administrative personnel. The dean of the college/director of the institute shall be the presiding officer of the college assembly.
- (b) There shall be a university assembly in each constituent university composed of elected members from college assemblies, representing the students, academic personnel (faculty and REPS), and administrative personnel. Vice chancellors, deans of colleges and directors of degree-granting institutes who have not been elected as delegates by their respective college assemblies shall be ex officio nonvoting members of the university assembly. The recognized unions for academic, administrative personnel, and university student council shall have representation in the university assembly and the chancellor of each constituent university would be the presiding officer.
- (c) There shall be a University of the Philippines System Assembly (UPSA) for the whole UPS composed of at least twenty-eight (28) members to be elected from the university assemblies of seven (7) existing constituent universities with each constituent university entitled to four (4) members representing the students, academic personnel (faculty and REPS), administrative personnel and alumni.

The members of the UPSA shall elect from among themselves the executive committee to be composed of a chairperson, a vice chairperson and an executive board composed of a representative from each constituent sector, the students, faculty and REPS, administrative personnel and alumni.

The term of office of all representatives in the consultative assemblies shall be for one (1) year without prejudice to their reelection.

SEC. 18. The Role and Functions of the Consultative Assemblies. – The consultative assemblies as consultative, consensus-building, democratic and collegial bodies shall have the following functions:

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- (a) To serve as the principal forum where faculty, students, REPS, and administrative personnel shall address nonacademic issues affecting the University, its thrust and directions, and issues relating to long/medium-term development plans for the University;
- (b) To promote direct interaction among the various unit constituencies of the University (faculty, REPS, administrative personnel and students) in the discussion of issues and grievances which heretofore have been mainly sectoral;
- (c) To serve as a multi-sectoral forum to recommend policies on administrative and nonacademic matters in consultation with the chancellors for approval by the Board; and
- (d) To act as a consultative body in the search process for deans, directors and equivalent positions in the units of the University, as may be necessary.
- SEC. 19. The Chancellor of the Constituent University. The administration of each constituent university is vested in the chancellor insofar as authorized by the Board and the president of the University. The chancellor of the constituent university shall be elected by the Board upon nomination of the president of the University, following a process of democratic consultation with constituents of the constituent university subject to the guidelines, qualifications and/or standards set by the Board. The chancellor shall report to the president of the University, and shall perform the duties and functions elsewhere as stated in this Act, and all the usual, necessary and related functions of the office of the chancellor, subject to the policies and rules prescribed by the Board. The Board shall determine the term and compensation of the chancellor.

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 SEC. 20. The Faculty. — The teaching staff of each college shall constitute its faculty, which shall be presided over by the dean, elected by the Board on nomination by the University president and upon the recommendation of the chancellor of the constituent university, following a process of democratic consultation with the constituents of the college subject to the guidelines, qualifications and/or standards set by the Board.

SEC. 21. Appointment Requisites and Practice of Profession. – Faculty members, as well as REPS of the University, shall be exempt as such from any civil service examination or regulation as a requisite to appointment. The provisions of existing law to the contrary notwithstanding, licensing requirements for professional regulatory boards shall not affect appointments to faculty positions. In the appointment of faculty members, no religious test shall be applied nor shall religious or political opinions or affiliations of the faculty members of the University be made a matter of examination or inquiry.

SEC. 22. Student Affairs. – (a) There shall be established in the University the following student councils: for every college and degree granting institute, a college or institute student council; for every constituent university, a university student council; and for the University system, a general assembly of all student councils.

The student council shall be composed of elected students of a definite academic unit of the University. Each member of the student council shall serve a term of one (1) year, without prejudice to reelection.

The student council shall serve as the primary student body that shall advance the interest, welfare and aspirations of the students of the University. It shall have the power to adopt internal rules of procedure consistent with the provisions of this Act.

The manner of selecting the student regent shall be based on the rules and qualifications set by the general assembly of the student councils of all constituent universities.

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(b) There shall be a student publication established in every constituent unit and college. Freedom of expression and autonomy in all matters of editorial and fiscal policy shall be guaranteed especially in the selection of its editors and staff.

SEC. 23. Land Grants and Other Real Properties of the University. -

- (a) The State shall fully support the UPS through the General Appropriations Act and other financial benefits, and in kind, through land grants, donations and use of other real properties. To carry out the intent of these grants, income derived from the development of all land grants and real properties shall be used to further the University's mission and orientation as the national state university.
- (b) Such parcels of land ceded by law, decree or presidential issuance to the UPS are hereby declared to be reserved for the purposes intended, as confirmed by the Board. The absolute ownership of the University over these landholdings including those covered by original and transfer certificates of title in the name of the University of the Philippines and their future derivatives is hereby affirmed. Where the issuance of proper certificates of title is yet pending for these landholdings, the appropriate government office shall expedite the issuance thereof within six (6) months from the date of effectivity of this Act: *Provided*, That all registration requirements necessary for the issuance of the said titles have been submitted and complied with.
- (c) Any plan to generate revenues and other resources from land grants and other real properties entrusted to the University shall be consistent with the University's academic mission and orientation as the national state university as well as protect the University from undue influence and control of commercial interests: *Provided, further,* That such programs, projects or mechanisms shall be approved by the Board subject to a transparent and democratic process of consultation with the University's constituents: *Provided, finally,* That funds generated from such programs, projects or

mechanisms shall not be meant to replace, in part or in whole, the annual appropriations provided by the national government to the University.

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SEC. 24. Grant of Special Allowances. – In order to continue to attract and maintain competent and excellent teaching personnel, all faculty members of the University may be granted special allowances upon approval of the Board up to a maximum amount equivalent to two hundred percent (200%) of their basic monthly salary.

The grant of special allowances may initially be implemented upon approval of the Board uniformly in such sums or amounts equivalent to twenty-five percent (25%) of the basic salary of the positions concerned. Subsequent implementation shall be in such sums and amounts and up to the extent only that can be supported by internally generated funds of the University.

SEC. 25. Effects of Subsequent Salary Increases. — Upon implementation of any subsequent increase in the salary rates provided for the positions concerned under Republic Act No. 6758, as amended, all special allowances granted under this Act for the faculty members shall be considered as an implementation of the said salary increases as may be provided by law. The special allowances equivalent to the increase of the basic salary, as may be provided by law, shall be converted as part of the basic salary: Provided, That any excess in the amount of special allowance not converted as part of the basic salary shall continue to be granted and paid as such.

SEC. 26. Funding Source. — The amount necessary to initially implement the special allowances granted under this Act shall be sourced from and charged against the internally generated income of the University of the Philippines, and that subsequent implementation shall be at such percentages, sums and amounts which can be supported by internally generated funds of the UPS.

The annual funding requirements of the special allowances granted
under this Act shall continuously be charged exclusively against the internally
generated funds of the University and shall, in no case, be paid chargeable
against direct or realigned national government financial assistance or budget
subsidy.

SEC. 27. Appropriations. – The Board of the UPS shall immediately include in its programs, the implementation of this Act, the initial funding of which shall be charged against the current fiscal year's appropriations and other internally generated income of the University. Thereafter, such sum as may be necessary as the national government assistance to the University shall be included in the annual General Appropriations Act.

The Board of the UPS shall assure that studies shall be made with the end in view of giving more funds to UP Visayas and UP Mindanao.

SEC. 28. *Tax Exemptions*. – The provision of any general or special law to the contrary notwithstanding:

- (a) All revenues and assets of the University of the Philippines used actually, directly and exclusively for educational purposes shall be exempt from all taxes and duties;
- (b) Gifts and donations of real and personal properties of all kinds shall be exempt from the donor's tax and the same shall be considered as allowable deductions from the gross income of the donor, in accordance with the provisions of the National Internal Revenue Code of 1997, as amended;
- (c) Importation of economic, technical, vocational, scientific, philosophical, historical and cultural books, supplies, equipment, machinery and other materials, including scientific and educational computer and software equipment, shall be exempt from customs duties and taxes;
- (d) Educational services rendered by the University shall be exempt from value-added tax; and

1	(e) All honoraria for professorial chair awards shall be exempt from
2	taxes.
3	SEC. 29. Auditing of Accounts All accounts and expenses of the
4	University shall be audited by the Commission on Audit, and all
5	disbursements shall be made in accordance with the rules and regulations
6	prescribed by the latter.
7	SEC. 30. Institutional Autonomy as the National State University To
8	provide greater flexibility to the University, it shall be treated in a manner
9	consistent with its institutional requirements as the national state university by
10	the service-wide agencies in the exercise of their respective jurisdiction.
11	The University, taking into account national goals and priorities, shall
12	exclusively determine its teaching, research and extension thrusts, plans,
13	policies, programs and standards and, on the basis of such determination, the
14	University shall recommend its annual budget to the President of the Republic
15	of the Philippines and Congress,
16.	SEC. 31. Rules of Construction No statutory or other issuance shall
17	diminish the powers, rights, privileges and benefits accorded to the University
18	under this Act or enjoyed at present by the University under other issuances
19	not otherwise modified or repealed under this Act, unless subsequent
20	legislation expressly provides for their repeal, amendment or modification.
21	Any case of doubt in the interpretation of any of the provisions of this Charter
22	shall be resolved in favor of the academic freedom and fiscal autonomy of the
23	University of the Philippines.
24	SEC. 32. Implementing Rules and Regulations The Board of the
25	UPS shall issue, within sixty (60) days after the effectivity of this Act, the
26	rules and regulations for the effective implementation of this Act.
27	SEC. 33. Repealing Clause Act No. 1870 is hereby-repealed. All
28	laws, decrees, orders, rules and regulations or other issuances or parts thereof

1	nconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed or modified
2	accordingly.

SEC. 34. Separability Clause. – Should any provision herein be declared unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of the other provisions of this Act.

SEC. 35. Effectivity. ~ This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in the Official Gazette or in any newspaper of general circulation in the Philippines.
